



## BA IN HUMANITIES MISSIONS CONCENTRATION INTRODUCTION



*“Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age.” (Matthew 28: 19-20 NIV)*



Earn a degree *while* you change the world. Most people see education as an interruption to ministry. That’s not the way that we think here at the College at Southwestern. Take our brand new program and earn a B.A. in Humanities with a concentration in Missions. In our classrooms, you will be challenged to learn the foundations of western civilization by reading the works that shaped our world. The unique seminar format allows you to discuss the works of Plato, Aristotle, Augustine, and Aquinas with your classmates. Imagine discussing the worldview of Erasmus, Luther, C. S. Lewis, and Jacques Derrida. But more than that, this missions concentration will put you into a partnership with the International Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. In the spring of your junior year, having prepared yourself intellectually at our campus, you will spend months in the field with an IMB missionary, sharing your faith and learning the language of your people group. Upon completion of your undergraduate program you can move right into a Master’s of Divinity degree in International Church Planting. Southwestern even offers the option of a “Jump Start” version of the MDivICP that allows you to do the field portion of your degree immediately upon completion of your B.A. in Humanities with a concentration in Missions. So, you can earn a degree *while* you change the world!

## About the Missions Concentration:

### Basic Qualifications:

The College at Southwestern is partnering with the IMB's Hands-On Project to send junior and senior college students between the ages of 18 and 29 on semester-long missions' projects as part of their degree. Projects are open to single and married students (without children and who are not pregnant). In the case of married students, one spouse must be a full-time student enrolled in the BAH Missions Concentration degree at Southwestern and the other spouse must be approved by the IMB for the couple to serve. Married students must also recognize that insurance provided for Hands-On participants does not cover pregnancy should the wife become pregnant during the international semester.

### Deployment:

After completing your first five or six semesters on campus, you will be deployed to one of the least-reached regions on earth to minister under the leadership of an experienced veteran missionary.

You will serve on a small team with other Hands-On participants as one part of a longer-term strategy to engage an unreached people group.

Following extensive field-orientation with other students working in the same region, you may be assigned to activities such as personal evangelism, mercy ministries, Scripture distribution, demographic research, or any number of tasks that advance the church planting strategy among your target group.

### Cost:

The Hands-On cost that you will pay to the IMB one month before you travel overseas for the field-based practicum experience (not including your regular tuition which must be paid to SWBTS in order to get academic credit) will be approximately \$2,900 per person, plus the cost of immunizations, vaccines, and any maintenance medications. The actual cost would be closer to \$8,300 but the IMB has agreed to cover the difference. So for a little more than \$2,900 you get a Hands-On mission experience for an entire semester—including your airfare, travel visa, travel insurance, modest housing, food, and local transportation! Once you have enrolled in the program you will receive coaching and guidance to help raise the funds for the portion that you're responsible to pay. It is important that the student begins to communicate funding needs for the semester abroad during the first semester of their freshman year. The student's academic advisor will help guide the student in this endeavor. The Hands-On portion *plus* the 12-hour tuition bill with fees will be approximately \$6,000. The student will need to plan on raising and/or saving approximately \$1,100 during each of the 5-6 semesters spent on campus before deploying for the Hands-On project. Some scholarship help from SWBTS may be available to help each Hands-On student with the cost of the program.

A major portion of the class will consist of a preparatory component (ability to explain the nature of cultures; describe and interpret the relationship between culture and behavior; identify and apply the principals of cross-cultural communication; envision contextualized worship). <p><b>Missions Practicum<sup>2</sup></b></p> <p>Field-based cross-cultural missionary work whereby the student spends 13 weeks of mentored study with the veteran missionaries responsible for the project's target people. <p><b>Linguistics Practicum<sup>3</sup></b></p> <p>Field-based language study as assigned by the IMB. This course is Pass/Fail. The student's supervisor will report on how well the student engaged language study and understanding.</p>	<b>MIS 3323</b>	3
<p><b>Evangelism Practicum<sup>4</sup></b></p> <p>Field-based cross-cultural missionary work whereby the student spends 13 weeks engaging the project's target people in order to share the gospel.
